Studying in Germany: general

- Types of courses
 - Lectures, seminars and tutorials (*Übungen*)
 - degree of interactivity
- The "academic quarter" (of an hour) "c.t." or "s.t."
- Weekly, bi-weekly (or fortnightly; ► A- and B-weeks), block seminars



Studying in Germany: expectations (the "hidden curriculum" 1/2)

- Full time students ≥ 36 hours/week
 - 6-8 courses/semester (30+ credits)
 - Don't underestimate block seminars (preparation, examination)
- Responsibility for managing your time: scheduling, reading, researching, studying, writing...
 - Preparation, attendance and active participation are expected for each class
 - Ca. 1/3 workload in class, 2/3 at home
 - Examinations usu. take place at the end of the semester
- As a Master's student, you are expected to work self-responsibly and pursue your own research interests
- Expectation that studying is your main occupation and priority
 - Punctuality
 - Avoid making other arrangements during class time
 - Notify the lecturer when having to abstain



Getting most out of your classes

- Take the time
- Prepare (esp. readings)
- Discuss with fellow students and lecturers
- Keep a critical mind and challenge what and how you learn
- Learning as 'co-creation' of lecturers and student



Studying the MPP: timeline

- <u>Calendar</u> of lecture periods in future semesters
- MPP-timeline
 - Feb 2025: Finishing Winter Semester classes, writing assignments
 - April 2025: Start of Summer Semester classes
 - July-Oct 2025: Designated Internship Period
 - Oct 2025: Start of Winter Semester
 - Feb 2026: Finishing Winter Semester classes, writing assignments, starting with thesis
 - Feb-July 2026: thesis writing, planning steps after graduation
 - July 2026: Farewell

Guidance in study-related matters

- Admin. Staff, esp. MPP Student Advisor during 'onboarding' Phase
- Lecturers know best about course-specific content and requirements
- From 2nd semester onward: Option to choose an Academic Mentor
 - Course selection and academic counselling
 - Potentially advice on internship areas and further career guidance
- During Master Thesis Writing period: Supervisor



Illness, chronic diseases, disabilities and neurodivergence

- In case you...
- ... feel under the whether and cannot attend a class, just email the lecturer
- ... are ill and cannot meet a deadline or a session with compulsory attendance (usu. Language courses): <u>notification of illness</u> (university form, signed by a doctor)
- ... have a chronic condition that regularly keeps you from meeting requirements or expectations, ask for a 'compensation of disadvantage' (Nachteilsausgleich)
 - Applies to chronic diseases, disabilities and neurodivergence

A few aspects on communication (the "hidden curriculum" 2/2)

- There are different norms of how to address people
- In (German) Academic Services: polite, clear and concise
 - what to mention to be on-point?
- 'Normal' response times?
 - When and how to phrase a reminder?
- University is structured into status groups:
 - Students, Admins, PhD-students, Researchers, Post-Docs, Professors
- All lecturers enjoy academic freedom (in research and teaching)
 - Also in grading
 - Nonetheless: lecturers must justify their grades and good ones value constrictive feedback, too.



Studying at WBS: Guidance (addition)

- Your co-students, senior students, student government might know/have figured out clues to your queries
- Moodle Information Desk provides general clues
- Also <u>Brandt School</u> or <u>University Website</u> might have the info you are looking for...



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Academic Proceducres: Academic Writing

- Re-take an exam(ination) when:
 - a) submitted and failed
 - b) Ill on the day of exam, before deadline
 - > Applies to all formats: written exam, written assignment, oral exam
- AI in teaching and assignments:
 - Guide on Moodle Info Desk
 - In essence: make use transparent
 - Otherwise "undeclared aid" => deception(!)



Academic Conduct: Academic Writing

- A social scientist's tasks: Coping with complex and diffuse social reality
 - Systemic search for insight/ knowledge
 - Comprehensible to others
 - ➤ Accurate and reproducable (→ validity)
- Assessment of your papers:
 - Structure (relating your work to the scholarly debate)
 - Format (e.g. referencing, also spelling, grammar... also tone(?))
 - Substance (concepts, theories)

Academic Conduct: The Academic Code of Honor

- Based on UE's Master Examination Regulations (M-RPO-2019 section 14, paragraph 3): https://www.uni-erfurt.de/en/brandtschool/studies/current-students/rules-regulations
- Academic Dishonesty:
 - Cheating
 - Using of undeclared aids (also LLM, AI)
 - Fabrication of data
 - Multiple submissions
 - Facilitating academic dishonesty (by others)
 - Plagiarism (next slide)



Academic Conduct: Plagiarism

Meaning: "[The] us[e] someone else's words, ideas, or data as if they were one's own [...]. This includes representing part of or an entire work produced by someone else as one's own – either with the intent to mislead or by omitting the true source and making slight alterations which leave the represented content identifiable" (Academic Code of Honor)

 We regularly run papers and every single thesis through a plagiarism check software



Academic Conduct: Consequences of academic dishonesty/deception

- Shortcomings in academic standards (less severe cases)
 - Downgrading or failure of the examination
- 1st severe violation of the academic conduct
 - Automatic failure, exclusion from re-take
 - Notification of the department of Studium und Lehre and the Examinations Committee
- 2nd severe violation of the Academic Code
 - Automatic failure, exclusion from re-take
 - Withdrawal of the right to take examinations at the University of Erfurt \rightarrow exmatriculation without a degree



Avoiding (unintentional) plagiarism

- Cite the actual source and make it clearly identifiable
- Insert/ manage your references while you read and write
- write notes, comments, summaries to collect and reflect your readings
- Reference manager software (EndNote, <u>Citavi</u>, Zotero, etc.)
- Clearly distinguish between your own ideas and the ideas of other authors
- Start early to avoid time pressure
- In doubt, consult your lecturer
